Malay Heritage Centre 7-min walk

Built 160 years ago by Sultan Ali, the son of Sultan Hussein Shah, the Istana Kampong Glam is home to the Malay Heritage Centre. *Jalan-jalan* through the sprawling grounds to explore the artefacts, murals and multimedia displays across nine galleries.

Singapore has a well-established kopitiam (coffee shop) culture that many locals hold close to their hearts.

Kopi in Singapore is made from Robusta beans, which have on average 83% more caffeine than standard arabica coffee! The beans are roasted in a wok with butter or margarine with sugar, enhancing the coffee's flavour.

Changi Point Coastal Walk 1 4-min walk

Take a leisurely stroll along Changi's scenic coastline via a boardwalk that's not known to many. Divided into six distinct sections, the 45-minute walk begins from Changi Creek (near Civil Service Club) and stretches all the way to Changi Point.

Pulau Ubin 10-min ferry

Take a bumboat ride back to the 1960s! Pulau Ubin is

an island touted as Singapore's last kampung. which offers activities such as guided walks, wildlife spotting and cycling. Get the most out of life in the slow lane as you pedal through rustic roads, explore trails and feast on fresh catches of the day.



Singapore's first halal floating 'kelong' restaurant! Escape from the hustle and bustle of city life for a rejuvenating experience while dining in the open sea. If you have already caught your own snapper or seabass, you can even bring it to them to cook it for you.
